SELF WORTH & IDENTITY- BONES OF CROWS

A few cast members joined the grade 10-12 students for a impactful movie showing of Bones of Crows. The movie is based on true events about a Cree women who survives residential school to become a code talker for the Canadian Air Force during World War 11 and how the trauma of residential school affected her for the rest of her life, which she faced with resilience and resistance. The movie speaks to the emotional, physical and sexual abuse that was experienced by the indigenous children and how that impact is felt through generations.



ACADEMIC SUCCESS- TRANSITION SUPPORT

For grade 12 students their final year in high school can be overwhelming to say the least. Lots of expectations to complete graduation credit requirements, the final Literacy assessment, and the off time table Career Life Connections class. Try to stay in the moment and take it all in can seem unrealistic for these guys as they are in constant future planning mode for most of the year. The transition team (Ms. Denton, Jen Lisle and Melissa Pinyon) are here to assist students in carrying some of that weight. Students have been brought in one by one for an interview on transition plans to identify their goal of post-secondary or employment and training opportunities. Once the students decides on a path the team works with each student to provide support as needed, this could be with ordering transcripts from BCeID or assisting in the application process to post secondary. As well as providing support for band funding applications. Students were under the crunch as applications open in October for most Post Secondary institutes in the province and all have various application deadlines to be aware of as well. Now that students have applied we are

looking at entrance bursaries and scholarships as well as waiting for the local bursary booklet to be available in March.
