


École Élémentaire Collettville

Community Learning Centre (CLC)



Here at CLC, based on student voices about what they wanted to learn, we spent the month researching Indigenous leaders throughout Canada. We defined a leader as someone who has demonstrated success in their chosen field and uses that success to uplift and celebrate Indigenous people and culture. The leaders the students chose to research and write about could be from any level—national, provincial, municipal, local communities, or even family members. In addition to the research, we viewed videos at the beginning of each lesson that highlighted various leaders, and we invited speakers to present to the students on topics of their choice, including our ISA and her experiences in a residential school, as well as Dr. John Chenoweth. The students enjoyed learning about their chosen leaders and hearing about the others selected by their classmates. It has been a wonderful month of learning!

On September 27th, we recognized National Day for Truth & Reconciliation with students and staff wearing orange shirts and participating in a community walk.

Our weekly assemblies continue to follow the Seven Grandfather Teachings, with this month's focus being on Respect. Students are learning about the impact of their actions and words on their community, and that we should treat others as we want to be treated.

The event was profoundly impactful as a residential school survivor from N'kwala shared her personal experience, bridging the past with the present and helping students recognize the ongoing relevance of these stories. Together, we learned and proclaimed, "əts há stim i? scəcmala?!" emphasizing our commitment to understanding and reconciliation within the Merritt community.




Lunch Clubs
